The Advisory Committee discussed and agreed that priorities for the current Committee term to end December 2015 are:

- ✓ Gardens of Stone Stage II
- ✓ Implementation and mid-term review of the GBMWHA Strategic Plan
- ✓ Co-management, especially through finalisation and adoption of the Co-management Strategic Plan
- ✓ Planning instrument zonings and provisions for adjacent land
- ✓ Progressing the National Heritage List re-assessment

The GBMWHA Advisory Committee is made up of scientific, technical, Aboriginal and community members appointed by the State and Commonwealth Environment Ministers. The Strategic Plan for the Area is used by the Committee to guide its operations and in providing advice to those Ministers regarding issues relevant to the Area.

The Advisory Committee meets quarterly in different locations around the million hectares of spectacular national parks and reserves that comprise the GBMWHA, recognised and protected for its outstanding universal values.
