May 2015 meeting update

Thanks to the hospitality of the historic village of St Albans, the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area (GBMWHA) Advisory Committee held a productive meeting at the <u>Courthouse B&B</u>, followed by a rousing gathering of members of the Macdonald Valley Association and local community who came to discuss local issues at the <u>Settlers Arms Inn.</u>

Ian Brown from Epacris Consultants outlined the Greater Blue Mountains Heritage Interpretation Inventory project and the Committee agreed to review the recommendations and identify which of those sit within the management responses of the GBMWHA Strategic Plan so that they can be taken into account in the midterm review.

The Advisory Committee resolved to:

- prepare a letter to the Australian Government to request advice on how it proposes to engage the Committee in the Badgery's Creek Airport proposal, providing information regarding impacts on the GBMWHA including noise, pollution, holding patterns etc.
- submit comments to the Springvale Mine and Tinda Creek Mine Extension Projects
- remind OEH that the Committee be involved in the Horse Riding Strategic Plan process, as previously committed to by the former Minister for the Environment.

The Advisory Committee meets quarterly in different locations around the million hectares of spectacular national parks and reserves that comprise the GBMWHA, recognised and protected for its outstanding universal values.
